Alicia enjoys volunteering at a hospice and elementary school. She also leads the Healing Harmonies club and does research in the Salman lab. Alicia began playing the cello at the age of five. She was a prize winner of the Jo Amish and the Mark Bradley Young Artist Competitions. Alicia also won the Rochester Philharmonic Youth Orchestra concerto competition. At Pitt, Alicia studies cello with Paula Tuttle. She was a recipient of the Gluck Award and recently organized a benefit concert to support music/arts education for low-income K-12 students.

Composer, conductor, and reluctant vocalist, **Cullyn D. Murphy** (he/him) focuses on amplifying the already existent musical components of sight, taste, touch, and smell in order to gain access to different modes of storytelling through music. More recently, he has been revisiting his rock band roots in communal music-making by creating music that engages with different varieties of performer input through unconventional notation and co-composition. Murphy's music has been described as "theatrical," "riveting and inventive," and "push[ing] the idea of what music and musical organization is." (Composer's Toolbox) As a conductor, Murphy has most recently conducted with the Parkland Orchestra, the University of Louisville Symphony Orchestra, and at the International Thespian Festival.

Roger Zahab enjoys instigating fairly complex and unpredictable interactions through his activities as composer, violinist/violist, improvisor, conductor, teacher, and writer. As performer/conductor he has fostered premieres of more than 200 works and his repertoire, spanning some 700 years from Guillaume de Machaut to the present.

Roger's work as composer and improvisor is primarily focused on the intersections of time, memory, and music's place in the community and society at large. His worklist for performers and listeners (from young students, avocational players to experienced new music specialists) approaches more than 400 compositions. Some are available on many labels and sites including Albany, Bandcamp, Crystal Records, Koch International Classics, Naxos, and Truemedia as well as through iTunes, Spotify and YouTube.

He teaches at the University of Pittsburgh and is a Core Founding Faculty member of Vermont College of Fine Art's MFA in Music Composition program.

Alastair Stout is an award-winning composer and organist. His music spans almost every genre, from solo instrumental music to works for large symphony orchestra. In 2001 he completed an 80-minute chamber opera, Releasing the Sky, based on the final flight of Russian astronaut Vladimir Komarov. His music has been performed by ensembles and soloists thoughout Europe, Australasia, North America, and Mexico. His music has been broadcast on BBC radio, and is available on CD, iTunes, YouTube, and SoundCloud.

Alastair studied organ under Dr. John Birch at the Temple Church in London, UK. He has given recitals throughout the UK, USA and Mexico, and recorded for the BBC. In 2002 he moved to the USA to become Director of Music at the Coraopolis UMC and then director of the Pittsburgh Compline Choir. In 2017 he was appointed Minister of Music at Grace Congregational Church UCC in Rutland, Vermont.

Alastair graduated from the Royal College of Music with First Class Honors in 1997. He continued his studies at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and at Royal Holloway, University of London, UK. He spent his early years on the Shetland Islands, UK and now lives in the USA.

About his work the composer has written:

Black On White is based on the 15th Century Compline hymn Christe, Qui Lux Es Et Dies by Robert White. The hymn is heard three times in the strings, each time being separated by a carillon on tuned percussion. The woodwind, brass, and percussion take turns to 'stain' the string chorus using fragments of the hymn in a variety of transformations. The hymn is therefore mutated by itself – Robert White discoloured by his own music.

Whilst writing the work, I also had in mind the painting *Three studies for figures at the base of a crucifixion* by Francis Bacon. I like the idea of warping White's music – looking at it from different angles in different lights not unlike some of Bacon's portrait ideas. The *Three Studies* also influenced the triptych structure and the religious source material.

This work was first performed by the University of Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra conducted by Roger Zahab, with artwork by Jered Welsh, on October 31st 2005 and again on November 2nd.
