and yet

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Dirje Childs is a composer and freelance improvisational cellist, with an MFA in Music Composition from Vermont College of Fine Arts. She holds a Masters in Counseling, with a long history as a mental health therapist and professional trainer across settings.

A seasoned studio cellist known for her ability to craft parts in the moment, she has performed and recorded for 25-plus years with countless singer songwriters, and with additional training as a certified music practitioner, has offered live music in large corporate trainings, hospitals and nursing homes.

"My cello functions as a spiritual voice of companionship--- respectfully offering tenderness and compassion to all." She writes music and plays cello from the deep well that is her "professional listening"—from years of being present with others—whether in therapy, in a recording studio or on a stage.

"Creating and playing music celebrates our shared humanity in all our fragility—that fuels my soul, ignites my spirit and illuminates my purpose."

Based out of Johnson City, Texas, she loves to conduct retreats and workshops related to the call to a peaceful and artful life.

Megumi Barclay is a sophomore from Easton, PA, majoring in English Non-fiction Writing on the Pre-Physician Assistant Track. She is minoring in Music and pursuing a certificate in Conceptual Foundations of Medicine. Outside of classes, she serves as the social media/PR Co-chair for the Japanese Student Association and the Director of Administration for the Frederick Honors College Student Council. In addition to being a member of the symphony orchestra for the past 2 semesters, Megumi is also involved in the University of Pittsburgh Varsity Marching Band and Symphonic Band on Horn 1. Previously, Megumi has performed with the PMEA District, Region, All-State, and NAfME All-Eastern and All-National Honors Ensembles. She would like to thank her friends, family, current and past music instructors for helping her get to where she is today – but especially her parents, Paul and Naoko. for their continued support in all her music and academic endeavors.

Roberto Gerhard (born 25 September 1896, Valls, Catalonia, died 5 January 1970, Cambridge) was born in the Catalan town of Valls and educated in the nearby city of Barcelona. Having studied piano with Granados until the latter's untimely death in 1916, he spent a further four years studying with the eminent composer and ethnomusicologist Felipe Pedrell. With a song cycle and piano pieces already published in Spain, and a piano trio accepted by one of the leading Paris publishers, Gerhard became in 1924 the first (and only) Spanish pupil of Arnold Schoenberg. After four years with

Schoenberg in Vienna and Berlin, Gerhard returned to Barcelona and devoted all his energies to propagating new music and establishing links with the literary and artistic avant-garde in Catalonia.

Publicly identified with the Republican cause throughout the Spanish Civil War, both as musical adviser to the Minister of Fine Arts in the Catalan Government and as a member of the Republican Government's Social Music Council, he left Spain shortly before Barcelona fell to the Nationalists, and after a brief stay in Paris, settled in Cambridge, England. Beginning with the first version of the ballet Don Quixote and culminating in The Duenna, Gerhard's entire output during the 1940's was explicitly related to aspects of Spanish and generally Catalan culture. The BBC's broadcasts of the Duenna and the 1950 Covent Garden production attracted much favourable attention in the United Kingdom, and Gerhard's reputation began to grow throughout the 1950s, though not in his native Spain, which was in effect closed to him. It was only in the 1960s that he achieved a genuinely international reputation on both sides of the Atlantic; and today he is widely regarded as the natural successor to Manuel de Falla.

Roberto Gerhard is published by Boosey & Hawkes.

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Roger Zahab enjoys instigating fairly complex and unpredictable interactions through his activities as composer, violinist/violist, improvisor, conductor, teacher, and writer. As performer/conductor he has fostered premieres of more than 200 works and his repertoire, spanning some 700 years from Guillaume de Machaut to the present, draws together many threads.
